




Balancing realism and idealism can be challenging. How do you handle this balance when portraying sapphic relationships?

Genre plays a big role in where my portrayal needs to land when the reader gets to that last page. Realistically, not every relationship works out, certainly not with the person someone's with on the first page of their story.

There's an escapism to romance that relies more on the idealism of sapphic relationships. But I think it's more than that. Being anything on the LGBTQIA+ spectrum in a world that sometimes feels like it's doing everything to prevent your very existence is difficult as it is. We're made to feel othered and wrong and simply that there is no happy ending for us unless it follows an almost fundamentalist, heteronormative path. Which is far from true, of course.

There's a significance in portraying happy endings for LGBTQIA+ relationships not just as ideal, but also as a real, everyday possibility. For that reason, I think it's also important to depict these relationships with authentic challenges, whether that may be distance, job or age-related obstacles, jealousy, miscommunication.

Whatever it may be, I think the key to that balance between realism and idealism is an earned happy ending, or happy for now. No couple, sapphic or otherwise, forms a lasting relationship without challenges.



Are there recurring motifs or symbols in your sapphic romance stories that hold special significance for you?

It's a little hard to answer this one because I don't write with themes or symbols in mind. At least, I don't set out to do it. But I guess a recurring motif in my romances is multi-dimensional, maybe even introspective characters. One of my favorite things a reviewer has said about my writing is: "Something Stephanie Shea is particularly good at is creating characters with understandable flaws, and having those characters own them."

I love a flawed character—I love writing them almost as much as I love reading them. There's so much room for growth there, and I really enjoy that. So I guess one thing you will find in my romances is not just a love story, but a personal journey for at least one person in that main pairing. I also tend to write successful queer women of

color, women who are either at the peak of their careers or captivatingly driven about getting there. I think it's important to showcase BIPOC characters in those roles too, as more than the sidekick or funny best friend, or someone's assistant, not because there's anything inherently wrong with those roles, but because that neither represents reality nor the ideal.

Could you share a paragraph or line from one of your sapphic romance novels that you believe encapsulates your writing style?

Of course! This is an excerpt from my latest release, *Take Two*:

"You can't take credit for my decisions, Andy. Good or bad." Whitney stepped closer. "Last night was my decision. I wanted..." Her muscles tensed in a physical warning for her to reconsider her words. Really, she didn't know what she'd wanted. To shut Andy up so she didn't have to rehash how dark everything had been those first weeks after Andy had left?

The worst part had never been the tears. It hadn't even been questioning if shards of glass were actually stuck in her chest, or if the piercing tightness was just her brain's way of saying her heart was still beating. It was wondering what she'd done, why everything they'd shared wasn't enough anymore. Or maybe she just wanted Andy. It's not like her body had ever craved anyone with the same untamed fervor. It's not like anyone else had ever made her dizzy with a single swipe of their tongue across her lips.

How do you approach crafting diverse and relatable sapphic characters while keeping their individuality intact?

In the last few years, there has been a lot of emphasis on the word diverse, especially in

association with BIPOC creators. But I think part of the reason—there are lots of reasons, really—there's such an imbalance in the consumption of "diverse" books is because of a preconceived idea of who the characters or their story will be, or maybe even how it will be told.

A writer I like a lot, Chimamanda Adichie, refers to this as "The Danger of a Single Story," which generally speaks to stereotypes.

A common assumption or explanation that I've heard, particularly from white readers, is that they can't relate to BIPOC characters, which is interesting because some of these same readers are avid consumers of books that center witches and vampires.

For my part, I don't think I've ever set out to write with relatability in mind. My novels feature protagonists of color because, from a racial standpoint, BIPOC readers deserve to see themselves represented in the books they like to read too. But that in itself doesn't make a character relatable. Relatability is something that readers identify in a character's personality, arc, their background and experiences, sometimes because of race, but also regardless of it. On that basis, every diverse character is an individual in their own right. There's no monolith to Black or Latinx or Asian characters. They don't all talk the same, or have the same background or musical tastes, because likes and interests go beyond race.

I write about individuals, who happen to be "diverse". I think all writers hope on some level that readers will connect with their characters and the story they've crafted, but not everyone will. ♥





In what ways do you think the sapphic romance genre has evolved, and where do you see it headed in the future?

As a sapphic romance writer, I want to make sure that I represent diverse experiences. In my work, I draw from my own life and that of friends, family, and colleagues, as well as seek input from those whose perspectives are underrepresented in the genre. I'm constantly searching for ways to amplify unheard voices and portray nuanced characters who resist traditional tropes. It's an ongoing process that requires time, effort, and patience, but ultimately allows me to create stories that demonstrate the beauty and complexity of our shared humanity.

What inspired you to focus on writing butch/femme romances and how does your personal connection to that influence your work?

As a writer who identifies strongly with the butch identity, I am naturally drawn to stories that delve into the intricacies of butch/femme relationships. These stories have an intimate place in my heart, as they offer a unique window into the complex dynamics that exist within these partnerships. From how they communicate to the ways in which butch/femme

love is expressed physically and emotionally, it all contributes to the way these couples interact and relate. The varied ways in which the characters navigate their own identities while simultaneously building connections with one another inspires me to tell their stories. As a writer, I strive to bring an authentic and nuanced portrayal of butch/femme relationships to my readers through storytelling that resonates on a personal level.

Can you share a notable fan interaction related to your writing, showcasing the impact your stories have on readers?

As a writer who delves into intricate and sensitive subjects in my stories, I've been privileged to receive profoundly touching feedback from my readers over the years. One interaction, in particular, lingers in my memory: an older woman confiding in me about her decades-long marriage, sharing the awakening she experienced while immersed in my novels. Another reader deeply connected with one of my earlier works, a novel that explores the profound impact of childhood sexual abuse. It's the highest form of praise for a writer to discover that her stories have helped someone navigate personal experiences and emotions. That's the bar I reach for with each and every one of my novels. ♥



What inspired you to start writing sapphic fiction, and how does your personal connection to the genre influence your work?

I've always loved fiction but rarely saw people like me - Black and queer - in early books I read. Once I started writing, it felt natural to start by telling stories I knew, stories with people like me as the main characters, whether they were meeting the love of their lives, traveling to interesting places, or turning into vampires.

How do you infuse your unique creative perspective into sapphic fiction while acknowledging established themes and tropes?

My fiction style has always been to try and "write pretty" about sexy situations and unforgettable characters. It took me a while to get around to troping it up. Even when I used tropes in the past, it was completely accidental. My character Agnes Noble in *House of Agnes* was an "ice queen" because I couldn't see her being any other way given her background. The "enemies to lovers" situation in *Every Dark Desire* was the natural response of a strong-willed woman (who was turned into a vampire without her permission) to an uber-dominant top who literally had the power to boss her around. Right now, I'm consciously writing a "friends to lovers" story that's also a "slow burn." For a writer who usually gets to the sexy stuff pretty early on, this has been an interesting change for me. Fun though.



Sapphic erotic fiction serves as both entertainment and arousal. How do you strike a balance between these dual aspects in your stories?

Telling an entertaining and engaging story has always been the most important thing to me. Erotic play between my characters is usually a given. I try to find balance in the space where sensuality complements the plot while stimulating the readers' investment in the story. Sometimes it's as simple as having a certain number of sex scenes. Other times, it's making sure the reader knows these characters well enough to believe in what's happening on the page.

Are there sub-genres or specific fantasies within sapphic fiction that you're eager to explore in your upcoming work?

I'm actually thinking about tackling F/F monster f*cker romance next. Maybe a short piece about a non-vampire type creature to dip my toes into the subgenre. Already, I have scheduled another romantic thriller, a contemporary romance, plus a romantic suspense so I don't have room for another full-length work on my plate. ♥



Can you describe your typical writing process when creating sapphic erotic scenes, from conceptualisation to final polishing?

Each scene depends on the characters, to begin with, and specifically what their sexual journey has been to that point. The journey is for each of them as individuals and as a potential couple. Every person who experiences sexual attraction has come from a different starting point to be their current sexual self. No two of us are exactly the same. And that's true for fictional characters too. I've already fleshed out my characters before beginning the book, and part of that is understanding for each of them what sexual attraction means, how they've acted on that in the past, how they want to act on that in the future. I may have a particular setting in mind for each erotic scene in the story, or some will come to me as I write. Partly the characters will 'tell' me when/how/where they want to enjoy each other. But sometimes, even before I write a story, a particularly hot idea will come to me and I'll jot it down and then when I start a story I'll look at all these stored notes and be like, "Ah, that would work for those two!" and weave that idea in at the right time.

For each scene there are three things I'm always thinking about: consent, communication, and the words I want to use to describe their bodies and their actions. Consent is sexy, and is paramount to every scene I write that involves two people getting intimate with each other. Communication is something not everyone is comfortable with during sex, and again that's determined by the characters themselves. But I'll always try to make sure that how they talk to each other, if at all, during their intimacy, is in keeping with their character and is believable. In terms of the language I use to write the scene, that again depends so much on the characters and the tone of the book. The language in *The Club*, for example, is considerably more graphic and earthy than the language in the multiple erotic scenes between Tamsyn and Maggie in *Write Your Own Script*, which again is different from the more gentle, euphemistic language describing what Carmen and Ash do to each other in *Dare to Love*.

Sapphic relationships offer a range of dynamics. What draws you to exploring the intimate connections between women in your writing?

I think many women, like me, were (and unfortunately



still are) brought up to believe that we are not allowed to be sexual beings. We are there to please our man, we should just (in the words of a famous catchphrase I heard throughout my growing up in the UK in the 70s and 80s) "lie back and think of England" when our man uses us for his pleasure. As a result, we have a lot of shame, guilt and fear over the act of sex and our response to it. So many women still think it's wrong to actually want sex. And even today, the sexism is rife when talking about women with a sexual appetite – if a woman has sex with multiple men in her life she's a slut, but if a man does the same with women he's a hero.

I went through quite the journey to rid myself of my own internal shame for being sexually aroused and actively wanting to do something about that with the person I was attracted to. So when I started writing sapphic books, it was very important to me that my characters were sexual. That they wanted to have sex – and in some cases, lots of it, e.g. the characters in *The Club*. I wanted to write sex in a way that showed women whatever they were feeling, however they were aroused, whoever they wanted to have sex with, it was ok. Totally ok. That physical attraction is not something to be ashamed of but celebrated, something to be proud of.

But I also wanted to show the range of that, i.e. from those

who are completely comfortable with being sexual to those who are just learning this about themselves. Those who thought being with men was the only way but suddenly are overwhelmed by their response to another woman. Those who have been hurt, emotionally, by a woman they thought they'd spend the rest of their days with and suddenly find themselves alone and feeling unloved and unwanted. For all these types of characters, sex can play such a role in their journey to themselves, and I love unlocking that as the story unfolds. Sex isn't everything, of course – the emotional connection needs to be there between the characters first and foremost. But sexual intimacy can add so much to that connection, and that's what I love bringing through in the erotic scenes I write.

Do you see your sapphic romance novels as a form of representation, escapism, or a blend of both? Why?

Definitely both! When I first sat down to write *The Club*, that one was first and foremost all about escapism. Women being utterly free to indulge their every sexual whim in an imaginary club offering a completely safe space to do just that. However, on a deeper level, it was also about representation. It was about showing that women are sexual (which ties into my answer above) and don't have to be ashamed of it.

My romances are also a blend. Yes, I'm inventing fictional characters, settings, and circumstances. And in a lot of cases offering a scenario which allows the reader to escape into a different world. But I've always written my romances with a heavy dose of realism, something that I've been commended for. Because I want to show what it's like for my characters in a situation that others can perhaps relate to. So they can see themselves, and read something that truly speaks to them, that understands them, perhaps gives them a different way of thinking about their own situation. Or simply gives them some hope that things could be different, that their path in life is not necessarily set in stone. I would love to think that someone, somewhere, read *Carmen's* journey in *Dare to Love* and thought, "ok, so maybe I can act on this attraction I have for women, maybe I can find someone who will give me what I truly desire, even this late in my life."

I know as a reader I want my sapphic romances to be all sorts of things, depending on my mood. Some of them I want fluffy and cute, not necessarily realistic but who cares because the love story is just so adorable it makes me feel all squishy inside. Some I want to be more hard-hitting than that, where the MCs face some serious life situations that I can either relate to because I've been through something similar, or which will make me think about something I've never thought of before. When I wrote *Dark Horse*, I was exploring the scenario of trying to reconnect with a birth family that had rejected someone. I know of so many queer

people who have experienced that, and I wanted to explore the nuances of that. For some readers this is not something they want to read, it hits far too close to home. So in other books, like *A Heart to Trust*, I wanted to show what found family is all about, how powerful that is for our community.

I'm not an author who is ever going to write the same thing over and over, I'm always going to explore that rich blend and enjoy what satisfaction that brings to me, and hopefully to my readers too.

What recurring themes or messages do you find yourself weaving into your sapphic romance stories?

As I've touched on above, found family is a theme that's very special to me and will often find its way into my books. My upbringing was not the best; I'm estranged from my father and although close to my mum, my relationship with my three sisters is brittle, shall we say. So my whole life it's been the friends who've stuck by me who have mattered more. Of course, losing them can hurt just as much as rejection from birth family, if not more so, and I've experienced that too. So I'm always going to write stories that explore all the aspects of family, drawing on my own experience and that of friends. It's a rich well to draw from – I wish it wasn't so, I wish we all just had a great birth family and long-lasting friendships we could rely on, but as I said earlier, I'm always going to be realistic in my stories, and so broken families and friendships are going to keep popping up.

Similarly, I've often written feisty older characters into my stories, be they grandparents, aunts, or neighbours (or chickens – see *Chasing Dreams* for details). My maternal grandmother, Nellie, was a take-no-prisoners kind of woman who I loved dearly. It took me about three books to realise that I was channelling her into all my elderly characters! But I've heard so many stories from friends and colleagues over the years about their cranky old grandad or whatever, and although they can be rude and set in their ways, they can also provide endless stories of fabulously over-the-top behaviour that just has to go into my books.

Finally, love is my most recurring theme. That could be romantic love, because I am a total, soppy, teary romantic who gets all the feels when two people get their HEA. Or it could be the love and deep respect two friends have for each other over the years. Or the love someone has for their career, or their pet, or the place where they live. As human beings we have such a huge capacity for love. It astonishes me on a regular basis how far people will go, both physically and emotionally, to show their love for someone or something, and trying to capture the essence of that is something that will keep me writing love stories for many years to come. ♥



How do you approach research when writing sapphic romance, especially when incorporating cultural elements?

Research is vital when I'm incorporating cultural elements that I'm not familiar with. I will do online research, purchase books on the subject and reach out to experts to interview and collect information from. For example, *Three Wishes* is based on Jinn legends which come from Middle Eastern and Muslim religion and culture and features a real island located off the coast of Madagascar. I bought a book on Jinn (*Legends of the Fire Spirits* – Robert Lebling) and Madagascar (*Madagascar-The Eighth Continent* – Peter Tyson) to ensure I had the appropriate information for the story.

What drew you to writing sapphic romance, and how do you strive to capture the essence of these relationships in your stories?

I was drawn to writing sapphic romance, particularly featuring POC characters, because I didn't see enough representation. What I did find were mostly tragic or shame-filled stories that didn't represent the life of the queer woman I am or the ones I personally know.



What's your strategy for incorporating unique conflict into your narratives without falling into common romance tropes?

I try to write realistic stories, even the fantasy-based ones, that show realistic life issues. Since real people have their own unique issues and ways to deal with them, I try to make sure my characters and story do the same.

What's the most unexpected or unconventional setting you've used to enhance the atmosphere in your sapphic romance stories?

The most unconventional setting I've used will be featured in my upcoming April 2024 release *Leather, Lace and Locs* which takes place in a fetish club. Most people would imagine a fetish club as a great sexy setting but not see a romance forming there. I decided to try it and see if it worked. We'll know in April if I was successful. ♥







Maintaining strong, independent sapphic characters while highlighting vulnerability—how do you strike that balance?

All of my novels highlight vulnerability. That's my jam. Everyone is vulnerable in one way or another, as human beings it's nigh on impossible to NOT feel vulnerable. Whether that is because of your past, your present, or simply who you are as a person, nobody gets away with it. Unfortunately. Sometimes I have naturally strong characters who try to hide those vulnerabilities, and sometimes I have vulnerable characters who become stronger by dealing with their vulnerabilities. It's important that my characters build one another up. That's also where character development comes in. Having a vulnerable character in the beginning of the book is going to be one of the main focuses as it moves on. If that character is still hugely vulnerable by the end of the book, then I have to question what the point of their story was.

Sapphic romance can span various age groups. How do you address different life stages and experiences within your stories?

I write my novels with the knowledge that anything can happen to anyone at any point in their lives. What may naturally occur at a younger age or older age doesn't mean it cannot happen the other way around. One example would be *The Arrangement*. Sam loses her wife when they're in their early thirties. Yes, that is something that happens, but it's less predictable than someone losing their wife in their seventies. Then there is *The Hideout*. Juliet is almost fifty but has never been in love



or even a relationship. Again, something you wouldn't expect by the time you reach that age. I try not to put people in a particular category based on their age or where they should be at by a certain point. I prefer my characters to dictate the life stage they're at. Everyone has different life experiences. Some have none, while others have far more than some.

While focusing on eroticism, how do you ensure that your characters remain multidimensional and emotionally authentic?

This is one of the most vital things to me in novels. Anyone can write a sex scene, but it's how it's written that makes it what it is. Even in erotica when it's not necessarily something emotional, there still has to be some kind of connection. As someone who is known for writing many spicy scenes in books, I have to feel the pull of the characters, or it doesn't translate well on the page. I think it's hugely important that writers are in tune with their characters, especially in erotic scenes. That way, the authenticity tends to come through naturally. If it doesn't come through naturally, then I have to ask myself if I really know them well enough to write an erotic scene yet. If I don't feel connected and in my characters head, it's difficult for me to put those words into action on the page. Knowing each and every quirk and being in tune with their backstory and/or current issues helps to advance erotic scenes. For example, in a book that has a coercive control backstory, both characters must be on the same

page. My characters MUST understand that it's a slow and steady process. Therefore, I'm not likely to write their first scene as something raw and heavy if one character is still processing the very fact that another woman is attracted to them in the first place. It's about showing trust for one another on the page, which again, if you're writing the scene in the correct way, will show the emotional authenticity without really trying.

Building chemistry and desire between characters is paramount. How do you create believable and enticing connections in your sapphic erotic stories?

From page one. That's the short answer.

My characters always meet in the first chapter. I like to ensure they have as long as possible to know one another. Before I write a single word on a new story, I sit and have those conversations in my head. I picture how they meet, what that feeling is when they shake hands, or when they smile at one another. If I don't feel the connection as that happens, then it's scrapped, and we go again. I have been known to cry into my keyboard during various scenes when I'm writing them. That's how you know you've got your connection. And I think writing those scenes is similar to real life. You know how you feel when you meet a particular person, and it's often those experiences I draw upon. We all remember our first kiss or the first time we met our partners, so when in doubt, sit back and remind yourself of that. ♥





What strategies do you employ to ensure that LGBTQ+ readers connect with your sapphic romance narratives on a personal level?

My characters are flawed, like we all are. Even my most heroic characters are facing situations they aren't sure how to navigate, but they're trying their hardest. I believe we are all doing our best, but sometimes we stumble and even fall. My characters are no different.

My ninth book will be out in November, and each character is a distinct fully fleshed out person. I know them all intimately and no two are alike, and my hope is that I write them well enough that the reader feels the same.

What's your approach to creating tension and resolving conflicts within sapphic romance narratives?

Two complaints I hear often are that readers are fed up with angst and miscommunication. Done well angst makes for a deeply satisfying story. Note the key is that it must be done well.

First, let's talk about angst, and why I write it. My favorite quote about writing is, "the writer's job is to put their main character up a tree, and then throw rocks at them." When my characters get their HEA, which they will, they've earned it. As a social worker, I believe we all have fears, insecurities, and pasts that often leave us guarded in relationships. I call these demons. Unchecked and unhealed these demons often ruin relationships. Love is the catalyst that makes my characters want to overcome these barriers, but it will take grit, determination, and



moments of angst to get them there. Anyone who has battled their own demons knows that it's not easy, so it won't be easy for my characters either.

Second, let's talk about miscommunication. Of course, nobody likes gratuitous or unbelievable miscommunication, such as, the character saw their love interest talking to another woman, so they overreact and breakup without explanation. This type of miscommunication is problematic in books.

But there are more subtle ways and reasons humans miscommunicate. Most people hide a part of themselves, some a small part and others a large part. It's the shield they put up to guard themselves against pain and their demons. It takes great courage and vulnerability to communicate openly, and the majority of people never get to that level.

How many times does someone say they're alright when they aren't? How many times do people hide parts of themselves for fear of being judged or shamed? How many times have they went along with something just to keep the peace? How many times does someone believe if their past was revealed others would find them unlovable?

Being human isn't easy, so I want my stories to reflect that reality.

Are there sub-genres or specific storylines within sapphic romance that you're eager to explore in your future work?

My tagline is: Hopeful, Eclectic, Authentic (HEA), so I embrace eclectic topics in my writing. I have so many story ideas that I'll never be able to write them all in this lifetime. I've found that my favorite books to write are the ones that require research.

Currently, I'm working on a story about Stockholm Syndrome, so I read everything I could about Patty Hearst. I've tackled the eruption of Mount St. Helens, homelessness, storm-chasing, whitewater rafting, among others.

I tend to read non-fiction books for this inspiration. My bookshelves are full of so many subjects; Hurricane Katrina, UFO's, Enron, DNA and genomes, the Manhattan Project, the

1920's just to name a few. I have half-jokingly said I will likely write in every genre before my writing career is over.

Writing intimate scenes can be sensitive. How do you approach these moments to ensure they're genuine and respectful?

This is an interesting and timely question. I just spent the weekend with several other authors at a Pride event, and we were talking about this subject. I make no secret that I don't enjoy writing sex scenes, and as I have written more books, I've moved toward fade to black.

I'm aware that some readers expect a sex scene or two, so they might not purchase my books for this reason. After much soul searching, I decided that's alright. In the end, I must be authentic and true to myself. My hope is that my stories will be compelling enough to draw in readers.

But just because I don't write sex scenes, doesn't mean the chemistry and heat is lacking. The reader will always be there for the first kiss and the building sexual tension, but once the clothes start coming off, I allow my characters privacy. Since I'm generally a slow burn writer, my hope is the reader knows my characters so well that they can use their imagination to fill in what happens next. ♥





Sapphic romance often explores emotional depth. How do you ensure your characters' feelings are conveyed authentically?

I approach authentic characterization by doing my best at providing relatable internal wounds that drive the story forward. The emotional depth on the page occurs when the gap closes between what my characters think they want versus what they need. Conveying this comes in a variety of ways such as crafting backstory, flashbacks, and internal monologue and one of my favorites: the moment they realize they are “Kenough” and wholeheartedly deserving of love. Throughout the books, I try to display feelings by how each character moves through life based on their own cultural lens.

Is there a sapphic romance sub-genre or theme that you feel particularly passionate about exploring in future works?

Some subgenres I'd consider exploring in future works include anything with high stakes because I love writing conflict and with a flare of mystique layered in—action, more angsty romance themes, psychological thrillers.

As always, I aim to provide page turning sapphic fiction for my readers and will continue to let my curiosity and skills expand if my heart calls to. That's a special part about being a writer. I will say, I do believe romance and making people laugh will always be a part of my storytelling. As well as each story including my unique flavor—sweet heat with sweltering kink, happily ever afters and memorable diverse characters. The more Fyre the better ;)



As sapphic romance evolves, what themes or aspects do you think will become more prominent in the genre?

There are more readers than writers in the world. Many days, writers wish they could finish stories faster because the world needs more quality sapphic entertainment. Books, movies, tv shows etc. As sapphic romance evolves, I suspect we will see an increase of a variety of themes across the board. The genre is growing which means there are more readers who want different experiences. Regarding what's becoming more prominent, darker themes are popular. Note: authors haven't only recently begun to write in that niche. These books have been around for years. As the world turns, trends usually come and go, but overall, I believe most romance subgenres and niches have a readership. When writers love the stories we tell (while keeping reader expectations and market in mind), readers will enjoy them too. Those are the books that are prominent.

I couldn't help myself to a mini, slightly random food analogy! Books are like eating tacos. Lots of people love tacos. Sometimes you have a craving for your go-to order and other times you want to mix it up because it's a new menu item or because your friends have been raving about it or it's on sale. Sometimes you have a mini obsession with a specific type of food for weeks and next thing you know, BAM you've eaten that item prepared twenty different ways.

Let's not talk about my two month salmon obsession...

People will always want more satisfying and joyful experiences. Ultimately, people's tummies are full and happy because of the joy of... delicious tacos—err sapphic books.

Can you discuss the significance of diverse representation within the sapphic romance genre and how it enriches storytelling?

Why is sapphic romance significant? To feel joy, to help ourselves and others be seen, heard, understood and more. When it comes to diverse representation, it's important to question the purpose and intentionality. Does it come off as checking a box for "diversity and inclusivity" pennies or is it about helping expand truth and creating joy? Our world is diverse. Ignoring that reality does more harm than good. Readers want to see themselves in sapphic literature. It matters.

For me, diverse representation comes from a place of genuine curiosity—knowledge seeking, responsibility (doing my best to get it right), compassion, listening and helping people see themselves. Authentically lift up voices and celebrate. Being willing to genuinely listen when someone shows bravery to have hard conversations about their experiences. That's community.

What enriches sapphic romance is the experiences, themes and emotions that are relatable to us humans, which encompasses diverse representation. ♥

Can you share a bit about your journey to becoming a published sapphic romance author?

I have a day job and I'd like to say I'm very good at it which gives me down time, but I have to stay at the office. There is only so much you can read on the internet, so I began to read books at the office. I live in a small town with an even smaller gay population. When I found sapphic fiction I felt like I'd found a whole new group of friends. As time went on I started to listen to TB Markinson and Clare Lydon's podcast Lesbians Who Write. They gave such good information and it made me wonder if I could do that. It's crazy how ideas will pop in your head as a writer, but the more I listened and read the ideas for my own book kept coming. I can't tell you how daunting opening that first document was, but off I went and haven't looked back. When I'm coming to the end of a book and don't have plans on what I want to write next I wonder if I'm done. But then something will inspire me or an idea will come into my head and here we go. This adventure in sapphic literature and romance has given me such joy and I plan to keep exploring as long as the ideas keep coming.

Balancing originality with established sapphic romance tropes can be tricky. How do you put your own spin on these tropes?

When I did the TLR's age gap vs fake relationship event I hadn't realized how many age gap books I've written. I must like that particular trope. During that battle we discussed all kinds of ways an age gap



can come into a romance. I think that's the same with most tropes. For me, I look at them as a challenge. There are some tropes I haven't attempted and may not, but I think you can keep the trope fresh because of the characters. Yes, you may have an age gap, or an enemies to lovers, or a fake relationship, or toaster oven, but the characters and their surroundings keep it fresh. You never know how people are going to react to a given situation. That goes the same for characters. The reader might expect them to act one way, but then when they act another that keeps the trope fresh.

Can you share a memorable fan interaction related to your sapphic romance stories?

Readers are the best! I love meeting and hearing from readers. There are several readers who email me regularly and I always enjoy it. I have been fortunate to meet several readers in person who have read my books. It amazes me how invested they are in the characters and how much they like some of them. I can't quite believe how much they like my books sometimes. It's incredible. I did a GCLS one day event in New Jersey. A longtime reader emailed me to let me know they were coming. We were both excited to meet in person. She got there right before my panel and I was able to say a quick hello. After the panel we visited for a few minutes and I signed a couple of books for her and her sister.

When I asked if she was staying for the rest of the panels she said no. She had driven over an hour and a half one way to come meet me, listen to the panel and then turn around and go back. I couldn't believe it! Still can't! Readers are the best!

Crafting unforgettable sapphic romantic moments requires finesse. How do you approach writing these scenes?

Ah, the first time their hands brush, a heated glance, the first kiss, sex for the first time. These are all so much fun to write, but it's thinking them through that's the hard part. I don't always know when the moments will happen in the story when I begin to write it. I know they will happen, but I have to get the characters there first. Sometimes the first kiss will come when I wasn't even expecting it (Yes, characters do often have a mind of their own). Once I get to those points in the story I stop and figure out what this part of the scene is trying to say. Are they both ready for this first kiss? Have they been waiting? Is it a surprise? Once I know what the characters are feeling then it makes it easier to write the scene. Some authors don't like writing sex scenes, but what I like about writing them is I get to show the readers the emotions the characters are feeling. I love a good romance and the feelings are the icing on the cake. ♥



Do you see your sapphic romance novels as a form of representation, escapism, or a blend of both? Why?

I try to represent the people in my story based on the demographics of where my story is located. If by representation you mean representing real life, I strive to make my stories as believable as possible in all aspects.

That said, my stories probably include a little escapism, too. I want them to be fun, even though they might touch on serious topics like divorce, addiction, grief, domestic abuse, and homophobia. I'd never call them high angst, but they're also probably not your typical beach read where there's zero angst.

As for why, I suppose it aligns with my desire to emulate real life. I think readers connect more with characters and situations in which they can identify. We don't always have sunshine and lollipops, nor constant trauma. Our lives tend to fall somewhere in the middle on any given day, with hopefully more instances of the former than the latter.

Can you share a unique source of inspiration that sparked one of your sapphic romance narratives?

I don't often use much real life inspiration when I write. It's fiction, after all. However, I set my first book in a beautiful place where I used to camp often. The area is unique, a dry waterfall that was once greater than Niagara Falls. That inspired the setting.

Another source of inspiration came when my partner attended two weddings in one day a handful of years ago. Her best friend, a Christian white woman, married a Hindu Indian man, and they had two ceremonies. The details recounted were fascinating. I found the prospect intriguing, and I wondered, how difficult would it be to pull off two weddings in one day like that? And what if the wedding planner was the sister, a wannabe wedding planner with little experience, and a cardiologist by day? And her caterer broke her foot at the last minute? So, that's what prompted my

upcoming novella, *Two Women, Two Weddings*, which will be out next summer in a compilation titled *Hot Hires* by Bold Strokes Books.

Building chemistry between characters is vital. How do you create palpable connections in your sapphic romances?

This might be one of the most difficult aspects in writing a romance. I've read great books by talented authors that contained interesting characters, a descriptive setting, and a compelling plot, but I didn't feel a spark between the women.

Creating those connections and that feeling of chemistry is a monumental task. It's not something that can be done once in the story and marked off. It's something that has to be built brick-by-brick considering each character's history, motivations, and fears. I try to make little things they might do for each other congruent with their personalities and to the situation. Another crutch I lean on is finding them common ground, be it affinities or activities where they can connect.

I try to picture myself in a character's shoes. If I were her, why would I be attracted to the other character? What about her would draw me to her? What could she do that I might find romantic? What about her do I find different from any other woman? Is there something in my (the character's) background that might make her drawn to a certain type of person? The

answers won't be the same for every character. Mostly, I find vulnerability to be one of the most powerful ways of creating chemistry between characters. When one character is willing to give something of herself that she's offered to no one or few in the past, it can create a unique bond between them, especially when the other character is aware of the importance of the rare gift.

I wrote that answer sounding like I know what I'm doing, but I really don't. I try my best, make sure I feel chemistry between the characters I've written, and when the book sails off into the world, I hope I succeeded. I have no delusions. I know that some readers have loved the chemistry between my characters, and others didn't feel it. So much of it comes down to our personal preferences. Just as some authors have my number when it comes to feeling chemistry between their characters and with others I'm left wanting, I'd never judge a reader for feeling the same.

I wish How to Write a Spark Between Characters for Dummies or an equation into which we could simply plug our variables existed. I'd be the first in line! To the readers who have felt the chemistry between my characters, I'll never be able to convey how happy that makes me, so thank you.

What challenges do you face when navigating the complexities of sapphic relationships while ensuring a compelling plot?

Like many of you, I first started reading sapphic fiction when it was called lesbian fiction or lesfic. Relationships were fairly straightforward, a lesbian and a lesbian, or often a lesbian and a woman who believed herself to be straight who was about to have an awakening, or later, a lesbian and a bisexual woman.

As society has progressed (yes, I'm aware that's difficult to say in this current political climate), gender and sexuality, or at least how people are talking about it, has become more nuanced. For instance, it's not like nonbinary people suddenly started feeling nonbinary. Or trans people suddenly decided to be trans, as medications and surgeries became more realized and available. There are plenty of instances of people experiencing such feelings and living such lives in literature and life going back centuries, if not more. We simply didn't have the openness and structure to discuss these things like we do now. I hope that with this new vocabulary in our lexicon, more acceptance will follow the more educated and acclimated society becomes as a whole.

Even if a story features a lesbian and a lesbian, queers rarely exist in a bubble, but often have other queer, diverse people around them. Making sure these relationships are represented, that all these women and women-loving-nonbinary people are seen and included, that their characters are fully developed, nuanced, and inclusive language is used can create complexities for authors.

Of course, there are many other important things that must be kept in mind when writing a love story between two women. For instance, I haven't touched on race or disabilities, which need the same type of attention as does gender and sexuality. In addition, the characters' relationship will also include complex issues, but often those fall under plot. And really, isn't that what we're doing in a story, navigating complexities? We just strive to do it in a new or different way and in an entertaining manner.

While I may have the best of intentions, do hours of research, and even use paid or unpaid sensitivity readers, I know I still have a fear of writing something that might be offensive to someone or even to a group. Don't get me wrong. I'm not saying I view complexities as negative. They're just something we, as authors, need to pay attention to, research, and represent in realistic, complex, and non-stereotypical ways. There is no shortcut, and it takes work, but our stories should reflect the world around us and the people in it.

Six paragraphs in, and I have yet to address the second part of the question. How do I ensure a compelling plot? Well, my plot will fail every time if I don't have compelling characters. So, half my work is done if I've spent time creating fully-developed, intriguing, unique characters with interesting backstories.

Plots, at least in sapphic romance, are often driven by tropes. While I don't start off with tropes in mind, when I write a story, I've found it's very difficult to write a book that doesn't include one, if not many. Personally, I don't have a problem with them. My only issue is when an author doesn't make the trope theirs, twist it slightly, or make it intriguing in some new way. I don't want to read the same thing over and over, so I'm always looking for something unexpected to happen when I'm reading, and certainly attempt to do so while I'm writing. Again, my characters make my plot compelling. Each character acts and reacts based on their personality, history, motivations, and fears. How they navigate through the story drives the plot. Therefore, the greatest challenge for me is to create a wonderful, dynamic, complex character. Once I've done that, everything flows from there. ♥





Could you share a glimpse into your journey of becoming a published author in sapphic erotic fiction?

I started writing sapphic erotic fiction because I like reading it and couldn't find what I wanted. I suppose that is why many folks starting writing any kind of book but I was particularly disappointed in the way Power Play and BDSM were represented. I started submitting my short stories to various anthology calls for erotic stories. My very first story to be accepted was included in the erotic short story collection, *First: Sensual Lesbian Stories of New Beginnings* published in 2015. It was edited by the amazing and delightful to work with Cheyenne Blue.

After that acceptance I just kept writing, submitting to various calls for short stories. In 2015, I submitted a collection of sapphic erotic short stories to NineStar Press, and my first book length release was *Dominique and other Stories*, published in 2016. My first full length erotic romance was the result of a long short story being rejected and my friend Megan Hart insisting that it needed to be a novel. I listened and *Sum of the Whole* published in 2017 by NineStar Press. Since 2015, all told I've written eleven full length books and nine novellas. I've experimented with other genres and enjoyed writing them but the work I most enjoy is writing is sapphic erotic romance, it owns me heart and soul.

Balancing sensuality and narrative depth are crucial. How do you maintain both aspects while crafting sapphic erotic stories?

The sensual scenes of an erotic romance have to work to move the story/plot along, just like



any other scene in a well written work. Each scene it has to do its part in showing character development, relationship growth, and moving the narrative along.

When I lay out my scene list for a book, I take time to make sure that the sexy times are placed in the narrative in a way that makes sense for plot structure, their relationship development, and character arcs. Erotic romance storylines revolve around the changes characters experience during intimate scenes. The sensual/erotic scenes are a necessary part of the plot for it to be an erotic romance. If you can take those scenes out of your manuscript and the story still makes sense you have not done your job as an erotic romance writer.

The most difficult part in writing any novel is making sure that your narrative pulls the reader along, that it makes them want to turn the page to find out what happens next. In erotic romance, each sensual/erotic scene is essential. Each sexy scene should leave the reader anxious to see what happens next in your story because the scene revealed something about the characters or their situation, ideally both things, and the intertwining of sensuality and narrative keeps people reading long after their bedtime.

Can you describe your typical writing process when creating sapphic erotic scenes, from conceptualization to final polishing?

I am somewhere between a pantsier and a plotter. I work from a scene list and often my erotic scenes are listed simply as sexy times. My scene list outline is a trellis that my story grows out of organically. I'm never sure where my characters are going to be in the story, so the I don't know the intimacy level of a scene until I get there in my draft.

As part of my prewriting, I do a character work. Before I write the first word of a scene, I know my character's goals, motivations, conflicts, why they can't have what they want, and what they would do to get what they want, lie they tell themselves and the lie they tell others. While writing if I ever hit a snag, I return to my character work, letting what I know about my characters guide me.

While drafting each erotic scene, and every other the scene in the novel, before I start writing, what am I trying to show here? What is most important for the characters to feel?

What do they want? What do they need to know about the other person? What do they want the other person to know? What do they want to keep secret from the other person? How can I make the scene sensual as possible? Where are they physically? How can I use the setting to make the scene more sensuous?

Because I take the time to know and understand my characters and because I enjoy writing erotic scenes it is easy to come up with erotic/sensual situations for them. The final polishing of scenes happens during revisions where make sure that each scene does what it is supposed to do as far as moving the narrative along, showing character/relationship development, the dialogue makes sense and that the scene is as hot as I can make it.

Themes and emotions play a vital role in enhancing the reader's experience. What elements do you often incorporate into your sapphic erotic narratives?

The themes and emotions I like writing the most are power imbalances, trust, second chances, starting over, unexpected love, friends to lovers, enemies to lovers, fighting against the odds, saving each other from either external threats or internal demons. I enjoy working out the dynamics of polyamorous romances. An adore writing about unchecked passion those bang first, worry about the consequences later stories, because I love the dynamic where they fall in love after they fall in lust. In my fantasy stories I have enjoyed writing stories of fated mates, immortality, justice, and revenge. ♥

How do you use settings to enhance the atmosphere and emotions in your sapphic romance novels?

I'm honestly not big on descriptions. I dislike them as a reader and often skim them, so as an author, I do not add a lot of setting descriptions. I sometimes make note of the weather or add weather to sort of combine that outer reality with emotional states my characters experience. I think I am more descriptive when it comes to the emotions of my characters, their contemplations on their lives and current situations/relationships. I mean, we all know how a living room, or a couch looks like, so knowing they are sitting on a couch in a living room seems enough to me. I tend to focus more on dialogue and their emotions. But if a setting is important or contains something that is relevant to what is going on, then I describe it in detail and try to use the impressions of different senses to enhance that scene.

What's your perspective on the portrayal of gender roles and dynamics in modern sapphic romance fiction?

I never contemplated that much. I write characters I find interesting. I honestly don't spend much time pondering gender roles in modern sapphic romance fiction. My characters generally would fit more into the femme/femme category, but even that is limiting because different people have different ideas of that concept. My characters are not super feminine, but they are not androgynous or butch either. I don't know. Again, this isn't something I



think about when writing. In the end, they are people trying to make sense of life and finding a way to live the happiest life they can. As for gender roles, I am big on equality and believe that people should support each other. In relationships, things won't ever be 50/50, but everyone should do their part to make the whole thing run smoothly. That is my goal for my characters, too.

Maintaining strong, independent sapphic characters while highlighting vulnerability—how do you strike that balance?

Another thing I don't actively contemplate. I write characters I can relate to, and they have all different kinds of strength and vulnerabilities. I am not trying to make them anything specific. They often also take on a life of their own. What I do avoid is making a character too perfect as that is boring to a reader (well, I hate such characters). Most of my characters are either driven more by either emotions or by their reason, and often I end up putting two such people together. So each character definitely has one issue or hang-up that causes problems, but I don't decide that from the start. This is something that usually shows itself while writing.

I like complex characters who seem real and not cookie cutter figurines—the woman with low self-esteem who thinks she is plain and boring and doesn't realize she is gorgeous until the self-assured, outgoing, popular LI shows her that, or the MC whose most tragic flaw is that she is clumsy. People like different things, and

I'm not saying what I dislike is wrong or flawed. I just don't enjoy it, so I don't write it. But again, tastes are different and I'm not judging there. It's just when I write, I cater to my own taste as I cannot make it right for anyone else. So, I suppose the balance I always strike is writing something I'd enjoy reading.

Sapphic romance can span various age groups. How do you address different life stages and experiences within your stories?

I generally stay away (if possible) from characters who are college age or younger. I cannot read romance novels with them as leads, and in other genres I often avoid them as well. Again, not a criticism, but it's an age group I am tired of, and I honestly can't be bothered with their struggles, angst, and problems. I am more interested in middle aged and older characters. Mind you, I also like age gap, so I often still end up with some characters that are younger (in their 20s or early 30s), but that's still a different enough focus that it works for me.

Again, I try to create characters that read and feel real, and as such I try not to gloss over stuff but acknowledge what it means to be in various life stages. But I am sure that I've messed up there as well, but I do my best. In the end, I go by my own experiences and the ones of my family and friends. I observe people and talk to them about all kinds of stuff. All of that influences how I create and write characters. ♥
